### An Unidentified Photo—Julia Conlin

This is the second of the two unidentified photographs I found while searching for topics for the *Historian*. The first unidentified woman I wrote about was Addie Lee Chapin Sleeper (*Historian* – May/June 2023.)

Julia Conlin was the fifth child and second daughter of John and Julia C. Conlin, immigrants from Ireland, who married in Worcester, Massachusetts in 1855. They traveled to California by way of the ship *Northern Light* to Panama, crossed the Isthmus, then took the ship *Uncle Sam* to California. When they arrived in Tuolumne County in 1856, they settled in Shaws Flat, where Mary Ann, the first of their eleven children, was born. The family later moved to Columbia.

John was killed in a mining accident near Shaws Flat in October 1877. As Mrs. Conlin was sick, and due to her unfortunate circumstances, a raffle was held in October to raise money for the family. Mrs. Conlin died a few months later in January 1878, leaving her twenty-two-year-old daughter, Mary Ann, and nineteen-year-old-son Thomas (Tom), to care for their nine

brothers and sisters, four of whom were under the age of five. Five of the Conlin children later died of tuber-culosis: Mary Ann, Andrew, Rosie, Charles, and Katherine.

Julia Conlin (whose photo was identified, see above) obtained her teaching certificate and taught school in Columbia for several years. Julia and her surviving sister, Margarete (Maggie), lived with their brother Tom, in Columbia's Wells Fargo Building. Tom was a well-known Wells Fargo agent. They continued to live there even after his death and ran a private museum, as well as managing the Conlin Water Company during times of drought. At one time, Columbia residents were allowed water for only two hours in the morning and two hours in the evening. The sisters also continued collecting information about Columbia in the nine-teenth century and writing newspaper columns about the happenings in Columbia in the 1930s.

On October 3, 1939, Julia died in Columbia and was interred in Mountain View Cemetery. A representative of the Wells Fargo Company of San Francisco attended the funeral in respect to this prominent member of one of Tuolumne County's pioneer families.

## The Truth is Out There (In Your Own Backyard)


Wed., October 11, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. **Tuolumne County Library, Greenley Rd.** 

With all this talk about UFOs lately, "The Truth is Out There (In Your Own Backyard)" will examine Sonora's relationship with these "unidentified anomalous phenomena." Hosted by the Tuolumne County Historical Society as part of their monthly lecture series, the presentation by David Simerley will be held at the Tuolumne County Library on Greenley Road, Wednesday, October 11, at 6:00 p.m. Sonora ranks fifth in the nation for cities with the highest frequency of UFO sightings. Although California as a state has more UFO sightings than anywhere in the country, Sonora is the only California city that made the top ten.

Who remembers the night deputy sheriffs chased a low flying UFO up Highway 108 before losing it above Dardanelle? How about the time a UFO buzzed downtown Sonora in broad daylight? Were you



alive the night in 1963, when saucers landed at Gibbs Ranch? This is the UFO story that has it all—mass sightings, close encounters, even secret air bases working on aircraft with advanced technology. UFO lore in Tuolumne County can be traced as far back as the Gold Rush.

We'll discuss THE SECRETS OF DELLSHAU: the Sonora Aero Club & the Airships of the 1800s (D. Crenshaw and P Navarro, 2009) as well as the Phantom Airship Mystery of 1897, considered the first UFO wave in American history. Actual footage of UFOs visiting Sonora will be shown.
